Teaching Fire Safety in our Schools

Our services will be sponsored by our community partners to help us deliver the three phases of our fire safety programs:

Phase I – Safe Environment

Phase II – Training

Phase III – Support & Maintenance.

Phase I includes the Save a Life fire prevention school program, while the final two phases provide training and support for adults and the community.

The Save a Life program requires funding from community partners. Our other programs will be financed through government grants and business operations.

We will provide teachers in First Nation communities with a resource package that fits into their existing curriculum. Our company will visit each school and provide hands on education in a fun and entertaining manner as part of the program. There are 90 first nation schools in Saskatchewan. Our goal is deliver the program to 30 schools per year.

- What to tell a 911 operator

Fire Facts

- government study noted that a First Nations people are 10 times more likely to die in a fire than the rest of the population
- There are about 24,000 house fires each year in Canada, resulting in an average of 375 deaths and 3,000 injuries per year
- In Canada, 1 out of 100 preventable residential fires are fatal
- Children need to have an understanding of fire protection in order to have a better chance of preventing a tragedy.
